

DIMETHYLSULFOXIDE (DMSO) - CHILD

Your child has been prescribed this medication to reduce potential damage caused by a chemotherapy leak out of his vein and beneath his skin. This is known as an extravasation.

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After you have applied the dry, cold compress:

- 1. Thoroughly and gently blot the skin of your child to dry it.
- 2. Put on surgical type gloves.
- 3. Apply _____ DMSO drops.
- 4. Spread the DMSO on twice the affected surface area using a cotton-tipped applicator with a wooden stem.
- 5. Air dry (do not bandage).

STORAGE

Keep out of the reach of children.

Store the DMSO at room temperature in its glass container.

NOTE

DMSO can damage plastic and synthetic fabrics.

For external use only.



POTENTIAL SIDE EFFECTS

- Local irritation
- Dry or peeling skin
- Itching
- Tingling
- Redness
- Feeling of warmth at the application site
- Garlic-like taste and breath
- Headache
- Nausea
- Drowsiness/somnolence
- Dizziness

WHEN TO CONSULT

Contact the nurse at the pediatric oncology centre as soon as possible if you notice:

- Onset of or increasing pain
- Onset of or increasing redness
- Onset of itching
- Presence of a skin lesion (blister). In this case, suspend the application of DMSO
- Skin breakdown
- Presence of discharge
- Swelling
- Difficulty moving the hand, wrist, elbow or shoulder of the arm where the extravasation occurred

Notify the nurse at the pediatric oncology centre and go to the emergency department if you notice:

o Fever of 38.3 °C (101 °F) once.

OR

Fever of 38 °C (100.4 °F) twice within a one-hour interval.
